Goals and Considerations

- For academic year '26/27, the administration will present a one-year rate proposal to **hold tuition flat** and **add minimal fee increases** to keep pace with rising costs. The Storrs UG proposal = \$240 increase (vs \$292 increase in '25/26)
- This is the second year of a tuition freeze, ensuring that UConn remains an
 economic value for students and families.
- The University will continue to address budget deficits in the next year through the Financial Sustainability Plan and Strategic Enrollment Management Plan.
- The necessary resources will be provided to maintain high-quality education and student support services.

Infrastructure Maintenance Fee

- Preventative maintenance of assets is required to drive down operational expenses

Transit Fee

- Funds campus shuttle bus service.
- Students receive unlimited access to the State's U-Pass CT program, which provides transit passes for rail or bus services, including CTfastrak and some Amtrak routes throughout the State.

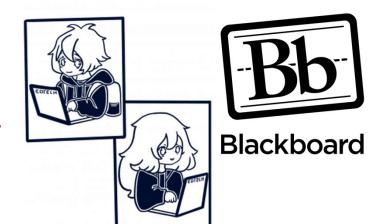

Housing and Dining

A 2.75% increase to the lowest housing rate. Housing increase will be used for operations & continued investment in the on-campus housing stock. All Storrs dining rates will increase by 2.75% to cover increased food and service costs.
