The following is the annual financial information and operating data with respect to the University of Connecticut (the “University” or “UConn”). This report is being filed with the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board (the “MSRB”) via its Electronic Municipal Market Access (“EMMA”) service pursuant to the Special Obligation Master Indenture of Trust by and between the University and U.S. Bank Trust Company, National Association, dated January 1, 1997, as amended, and supplemented (the “Indenture”) and the University’s continuing disclosure agreements (the “Continuing Disclosure Agreements”) entered into in connection with the issuance of UConn special obligation student fee revenue bonds.

This statement is limited in scope. It contains only an update of certain financial and operating data referenced below. The information set forth herein does not contain all material information concerning the University necessary to make an informed investment decision. This statement does not constitute an offer to sell or the solicitation of an offer to buy UConn bonds. This statement is intended to provide only the information necessary to conform to the requirements of the Indenture and the Continuing Disclosure Agreements.

The Annual Report for the University, including financial statements and certain financial information and operating data, is attached hereto.

COMPETITION AND COMPETITIVENESS

Student Admissions and Enrollment

Admissions. The University continues to be in high demand with first year applications for all campuses at nearly 66,300 for the Fall 2025 entering class. The University of Connecticut ranks number 32 among the top public universities in the nation according to U.S. News & World Report Best Colleges.

Tuition and Other Fees (Storrs and Regional Campuses)

Pursuant to State law, the Board of Trustees is authorized to adopt a comprehensive schedule of tuition and other fees, which is expected to prevail during the following fiscal year.

Tuition. For the academic year 2026, students classified as full-time undergraduate residents of Connecticut will pay tuition of \$17,010. Full-time out-of-state undergraduates will pay \$39,678 per year. In the 2026 academic year, total tuition revenues are forecasted to be \$606.5 million. For the academic year 2027, full-time undergraduate residents will pay tuition of \$17,010, and full-time out-of-state undergraduates will pay tuition of \$39,678 per year.

Mandatory Fees. For the academic year 2026, undergraduate students must pay a General University Fee of \$1,668 per year. Students also pay \$2,656 per year in other fees, of which \$856 is for Student Health and Wellness, \$500 is for the Student Recreation Center, \$196 is for various student-controlled organizations, \$688 is for infrastructure maintenance, \$212 is a transit fee, and \$204 is a Technology Fee. For the academic year 2027, the General University Fee will be \$1,668. Students will also pay \$2,896 in other fees, of which \$896 is for Student Health and Wellness, \$500 is for the Student Recreation Center, \$202 is for various student-controlled organizations, \$756 is for infrastructure maintenance, \$254 is a transit fee, and \$288 is a Technology Fee. Commencing in 1998, certain fees have been pledged for the payment of debt service on the University's Special Obligation Bonds.

Other Fees. There are numerous optional fees at the University. The primary optional fees for the academic year 2026 are the room (\$8,066) and board (\$6,710) fee. For academic year 2027 the room fee will be \$8,288 and board will be \$6,894. Rates reflect a standard double room and the Value Meal Plan, higher and lower cost options are available.

Student Financial Aid

The University provides financial aid and financial counseling. The University has a policy of admitting students without regard to financial ability to pay and a policy of providing assistance to those admitted who demonstrate need. Approximately 86% of all undergraduates are receiving some form of financial aid.

Scholarships, Grants and Work-Study. In addition to university financial aid, there are a number of state, federal and private student financial aid programs available, including the Federal Pell Grant of up to \$7,395 (for Fiscal Year 2026) and the Federal Supplemental Education Opportunities Grant (SEOG) of up to \$4,000. Both are awarded annually based on need. In addition, the University offers a number of merit scholarships. The University also offers Federal Work-Study employment, which is need-based, and Student Labor employment, which is available to all students.

Loan Programs. There are several loan programs at the University. Federal Direct Subsidized Stafford Loans are based on financial need, and the Federal Direct Unsubsidized Stafford Loans are available to students who do not qualify for the Federal Direct Subsidized Stafford Loans. Additionally, there is the Federal Direct Parent Loan to Undergraduate Students (PLUS) program, and the Federal Direct Graduate PLUS loan is available to eligible graduate students.

Tuition Waivers and Graduate Assistantships. The University is required by law to waive tuition for certain veterans and children of veterans, certain students over the age of 62, graduate assistants, and certain other students. The University is required by collective bargaining agreements to waive tuition for dependents of certain employees. The foregone revenue resulting from all such waivers in the 2026 academic year is budgeted at \$107.2 million.

University Spending Plan (Storrs and Regional Campuses)

Fiscal Year 2026 Spending Plan. The Fiscal Year 2026 forecast includes \$1,832.3 million in expenditures and \$1,820.4 million of revenue plus the use of \$12.0 million of unrestricted fund balances to balance the budget.

Fiscal Year 2026 Revenue. For Fiscal Year 2026, tuition is the largest source of revenue (excluding waivers) and is forecasted at \$606.5 million, an increase of \$23.4 million or 4% over the Fiscal Year 2025 amount. Tuition revenue collections reflect a \$0 annual rate increase. Fee revenue is comprised of course fees from summer school, part-time, and non-degree students as well as self-supporting programs (off-campus MBA, EMBA, etc.). Also included in this category is the General University Fee, which supports multiple student support programs. There are various other fees included in this category such as the Student Recreation Center Fee, Infrastructure Maintenance Fee, Application Fees and Late Payment Fees. The fee collections for Fiscal Year 2026 are forecasted to be \$185.2 million, an increase of \$7.5 million or 4.3% more than the Fiscal Year 2025 amount. Grants and Contracts Revenue and Auxiliary Enterprise Revenue comprise the second- and third-largest revenue sources, and are forecasted to be \$339.0 million and \$291.6 million, respectively. Residence halls and rental properties, dining services and athletics generate most of the Auxiliary Enterprise Revenue.

Fiscal Year 2026 Expenditures. Total Fiscal Year 2026 expenditures of \$1,832.3 million are forecasted to increase by \$20.5 million or 1.1% more than the Fiscal Year 2025 amount. Personal services expenditures are forecasted to reach \$766.5 million or \$7.2 million more than Fiscal Year 2025. Fringe benefit expenditures are forecasted to be \$179.6 million or \$6.1 million more than Fiscal Year 2025. Financial Aid - Tuition expenditures are forecasted to be \$217.4 million, which is an increase of \$21.1 million more than the Fiscal Year 2025 amount. Financial Aid - Other expenditures are forecasted to be \$129.0 million, which is an increase of \$1.5 million over the Fiscal Year 2025 amount.

The current funds format shows gross student tuition and fees and does not net out scholarship allowances, as required in the financial statements which are prepared in the GASB Nos. 34/35 format. Scholarship allowances are shown as an expense item. In addition, the University's current funds format includes equipment purchases as an expense, does not include depreciation or amortization, does not include pension and OPEB expenses as it relates to GASB 68 and does not include the State debt service commitment for principal and interest. All expenses related to legal matters in the current funds format are reflected in the fiscal year that they are paid.

State Support of the University – Appropriations

The State develops a biennial budget, which includes the University appropriation request. The appropriations are applicable to each specific year and the second year's appropriation is subject to review and adjustment. The annual State appropriation the University receives is in the form of a block grant and is allotted quarterly. The University has independent authority to purchase goods and services; hire, fire and promote administrators, faculty, and staff; and plan, design, and construct capital projects. Public Act 25-168 appropriated \$268.2 million in block grant to the University, as well as a \$1.0 million fringe reimbursement related adjustment to the University for Fiscal Year 2026 and a \$253.5 million block grant and \$1.0 million fringe reimbursement related adjustment for Fiscal Year 2027.

Beginning in Fiscal Year 2024, the State implemented a change in its fringe benefit funding structure, intended to be budget-neutral, now covering all retirement fringe costs for all University employees participating in

State-sponsored retirement plans. As a result, the University did not pay retirement costs for these plans beginning in Fiscal Year 2024 and these costs and the associated State funding are not included in the budget.

No assurance can be made that the State will not change the Fiscal Year 2026 funding prior to the end of such fiscal year. Any State funding cuts are expected to be managed by the University through reduced hiring, reduced operating costs, fewer projects, and other deficit mitigation efforts.

The State Bond Commission approved \$33,000,000 of the FY25 authorization on December 20, 2024. To date, the remaining authorization has not been approved by the State Bond Commission.
- ¹² Public Act 25-174 (sections 2 & 21) authorized \$79,000,000 in State General Obligation Bonds for the University and the University of Connecticut Health Center, for various purposes. The State Bond Commission approved \$5,000,000 of the FY26 authorization on December 18, 2025. To date, the remaining authorization has not been approved by the State Bond Commission.

Grants and Contracts

Revenue from federal, state, local and non-governmental grants and contracts totaled \$281.3 million in Fiscal Year 2025, representing 26.1% of total operating revenues reported by the University in the Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Position for the Fiscal Year ended June 30, 2025, included in this Annual Report. If non-governmental grants are excluded, the revenue from federal, state, and local governmental grants and contracts, totaled \$244.5 million for this time period, which represented 22.7% of total operating revenues.

The University of Connecticut Foundation, Inc.

The University of Connecticut Foundation, Inc., (the “Foundation”) is a separate entity that supports the mission of the University. For financial reporting purposes, the Foundation is an independent, privately governed institution, which is separately audited. The Foundation operates exclusively for charitable and educational purposes, raising funds to promote, encourage, and assist education and research at the University and UConn Health. The Foundation solicits and accepts donations of properties, monies, and securities and invests and administers these gifts. The Foundation materially supports the mission of both the University and UConn Health.

Gift revenue to the University, both capital and noncapital, is derived from gifts made directly to the University and from the Foundation. These spendable funds are provided to the University for educational, cultural, recreational, and research activities. The Foundation disburses funds to the University as requests are made, provided the request is in accordance with donor restrictions, if any. These disbursements paid to the University and to third parties on behalf of the University from the Foundation totaled approximately \$65.0 million in Fiscal Year 2025 compared to \$50.3 million in Fiscal Year 2024. In addition, the University receives gifts directly. Total non-operating gifts and capital gifts and grants revenue to the University from all sources amounted to \$14.2 million and \$12.7 million in Fiscal Years 2025 and 2024, respectively.

Giving University-wide continued at high levels, with contributions of \$144.2 million to support the University students, faculty, and programs during Fiscal Year 2025. Of the \$144.2 million in new gifts and commitments, \$45.1 million was directed for scholarships and fellowships, \$76.3 million for program support, \$17.2 million for research, \$1.8 million for faculty support, and \$3.5 million for capital improvements. Donors contributed \$37.0 million to the University’s endowment. The endowment portfolio was valued at \$668.6 million at the end of Fiscal Year 2025, including \$281.0 million for scholarships and fellowships, \$172.4 million for endowed chairs, professorships and other faculty support, and \$215.1 million for programmatic priorities. Endowed funds are managed by the Foundation Board of Directors’ investment committee, Foundation management, and staff. The endowment is managed as a single portfolio, but funds are invested in various asset classes to diversify risk.

University Indebtedness

The UCONN 2000 Act, as amended, empowers the University to borrow money and issue securities to finance the acquisition, construction, reconstruction, improvement or equipping of any UCONN 2000 project and to provide for the security and payment of those securities and to refund such securities. Toward this purpose, to date, the University has issued General Obligation Bonds and Special Obligation Bonds, entered a privately placed Governmental Lease Purchase Agreement, and assumed a promissory note associated with the purchase of the Nathan Hale Inn on the Storrs Campus. As of December 31, 2025, certain General Obligation Bonds and Special Obligation Bonds will remain outstanding. The promissory note associated with the purchase of the Nathan Hale Inn was retired on December 1, 2016 and the Governmental Lease Purchase Agreement was retired on December 12, 2025.

The University of Connecticut General Obligation Bonds are issued pursuant to the Master Indenture of Trust, as amended (the "Master Indenture"), are secured by the full faith and credit of the University and are additionally secured by the pledge of and a lien upon the State Debt Service Commitment. The State Debt Service Commitment is defined by the Act and the Master Indenture as the commitment by the State to pay an annual amount for the punctual payment of Special Debt Service Requirements on certain securities issued as general obligations of the University, as the same shall arise and shall become due and payable. Special Debt Service Requirements include, among other things, the principal and sinking fund installments for and interest accruing on such General Obligation Bonds. As of December 31, 2025, the University's General Obligation Bonds principal outstanding will be \$1,459,350,000.

The University of Connecticut Special Obligation Bonds are issued pursuant to the Special Obligation Indenture of Trust, as amended (the "Special Obligation Master Indenture"). The Board of Trustees approved the Special Obligation Master Indenture on November 8, 1996. Unlike the UCONN 2000 General Obligation Bonds that are paid from the State's General Fund, debt service on the Special Obligation Bonds is paid from certain pledged revenues, including student fees of the University as defined in the Special Obligation Master Indenture. To date, eleven projects have been authorized to receive \$441,180,000 of the UCONN 2000 Special Obligation Bond proceeds, and these projects may also be supported by the University's General Obligation Bonds, State General Obligation Bonds or other funding. As of December 31, 2025, the University's Special Obligation Bonds principal outstanding will be \$248,825,000.

In addition to UCONN 2000 indebtedness, the University has certain other limited indebtedness; see Schedule 1, "AUDITED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY FOR FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2025".

**Assumptions and Footnotes to Statement of Coverage Levels
Special Obligation Student Fee Revenue Bonds**

(A) **Assumptions used to build the projected revenues and expenses are as follows:**

Revenue

Infrastructure Maintenance Fee - The Infrastructure Maintenance Fee, which funds certain Special Obligation Student Fee Revenue debt service, facilities operating and maintenance costs, and preventive and deferred maintenance costs, was instituted on July 1, 1997. For FY26, the Infrastructure Maintenance Fee rate is \$688, for full-time Undergraduate and Graduate/Professional students (excluding Graduate Assistants). The projections for FY27-FY30 assume a \$68 rate increase for FY27 and annual enrollment increases thereafter.

General University Fee ("GUF") - The General University Fee primarily supports Jorgensen Center for the Performing Arts, Student Activities, Student Union, Athletics, Career Services, Student Recreation, and specific other departments. For FY26, GUF is \$1,668 for full-time Undergraduate students and \$1,170 for full-time Graduate/Professional students at the Storrs campus, and is expected to remain flat for FY27. The projections for FY27-FY30 assume annual enrollment increase..

Student Health and Wellness Fee - The Student Health and Wellness Fee supports student well-being, including medical and mental health services, health promotion, and wellness activities. For FY26, the fee for Storrs Undergraduate and Graduate/Professional students is \$856, and Undergraduate Regional students is \$88. The projections for FY27-FY30 assume a \$40 increase to Storrs Undergraduate and Graduate/Professional students, and a \$34 increase for Undergraduate Regional students and Graduate students at the School of Law and School of Social Work for FY27, and annual enrollment increases thereafter.

Investment Income - Bond proceeds are invested in the State Treasurer's Short-Term Investment Fund, which has daily liquidity and rates. The actual historical rates may be found on the State of Connecticut Office of the State Treasurer website. FY26-30 reflect projections for non-bond proceed investment earnings. The investment earnings on this table do not reflect the investment of proceeds from the Trustee Bank-held Renewal and Replacement Fund.

Athletic Stadia - FIT (Facility Investment Together) Fee - The University includes a \$5 surcharge on football tickets, a \$2 surcharge on men's ice hockey, men's basketball, and women's basketball tickets, and a \$1 surcharge on men's and women's soccer tickets. Projections for FY27-FY30 assume no fee increases and attendance being held at projected FY26 levels.

Student Recreation Center Fee - The Student Recreation Center fee is a mandatory student fee for Storrs-based students; in FY26, the Undergraduate rate is \$500/year, and the Graduate rate is \$400/year. The projections for FY27-FY30 assume annual enrollment increases.

Residential Life Room Fee, Student Apartment Rentals and Greek Housing Fee - The Undergraduate regular double room rate for FY26 is \$8,066 reflecting a \$216 increase over FY25. Housing counts are also higher in FY26, due to increased bed count across the Storrs and regional campuses. The Greek Housing Fee is reflected on the Residential Life Room Fee line coverage level reporting purposes. The Greek Housing room rate is \$10,616 in FY26, reflecting an 8% rate increase over FY25. The projections for FY27-FY30 are based on 100% occupancy with 3% rate increases annually.

Board (Dining) Fee - In FY26, the most popular meal plan is the Value Meal Plan, which costs \$6,710, a \$180 increase over FY25. The projections for FY27-FY30 are based on 100% occupancy with 2.75% rate increases annually.

Parking and Transportation Fees - Parking and Transportation Fees consist of the Transit Fee, Parking Permits, Parking Tickets, Transient Parking, Meter Revenue, and Event Parking. FY26 revenues include a \$212 Transit Fee for Undergraduate and Graduate/Professional students. The projections for FY27-FY30 assume a \$42 rate increase for FY27 and 1% annual rate increases thereafter.

Expenses - Included in expenses are all direct expenses and certain operating transfers.

CRF/HEERF III - The University received \$10.75 million in FY20 under the CARES Act, Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF), for refunded room and board income. These funds were used to offset expenses. In FY21 and FY22, the University applied funds to offset housing and dining revenue losses due to COVID. Based on Federal guidance, the University reasonably allocated a portion of the relief funds to the cost of repairing, insuring, and operating those facilities for which such fees are imposed. These funds are reflected as offsets in expenditures, following Federal guidance.

Residential Life Rooms, Student Apartments and Greek Housing - FY21 and FY22 reflect the offset of expenditures from HEERF funds and reduced occupancy. The projection for FY26 assumes increased costs reflecting additional occupancy, including costs associated with increased bed count at the Storrs and regional campuses, and 2.5% inflationary growth; FY27-FY30 assumes 2.5% inflationary growth. Greek Housing revenues and expenses are reflected on the Residential Life Room Fee line for coverage level reporting purposes.

Board (Dining) - FY21 and FY22 reflect the offset of expenditures from HEERF funds and reduced occupancy. The projection for FY26 assumes increased costs reflecting additional occupancy, and 2.75% inflationary growth; FY27-FY30 assumes 2.5% inflationary growth.

Parking and Transportation - The projection for FY26-FY30 assumes 2.5% inflation.

- (B) On November 15, 2022, the Special Obligation 2022 Refunding Series A Revenue Bonds refunded all the outstanding \$54,795,000 of Special Obligation 2012 Refunding Series A Revenue Bonds
- (C) No assurance can be given that these coverage levels will not change since projections can vary, and the University may authorize additional projects and issue additional bonds under the Special Obligation Indenture; the effect of which may change coverage levels subject to the rate covenant of 1.25 times the maximum Debt Service Requirement on all Outstanding Bonds (including the additional bonds). See the Special Obligation Indenture for related information.

- (D) Reserves Available for Renewal, Replacement and Operations and Renewal and Replacement Fund held at Trustee Bank:
Reserves Available for Renewal, Replacement, and Operations represent funds reserved for the payment or reimbursement of extraordinary expenses incurred for the rebuilding, replacement, relocating, repair and restoration of any UCONN 2000 project financed by the University under the Indentures and other facilities which are part of the physical plant enabling the University to operate and maintain the physical plant in sound operating condition. Funds may also be used in the event of significant revenue or expense variances.
Additionally, pursuant to the Indenture, the University established a Renewal and Replacement Fund at the Trustee Bank which may be used for similar purposes, including debt service. The assets are pledged as part of the Trustee Bank and are shown at the bottom of the coverage table.
- (E) Additionally, not reflected on this table, the University maintains other unrestricted funds apart from Pledged Revenues which are available to pay debt service for current and future Special Obligation Bonds and other uses including renewal and replacement, which as of June 30, 2025, had a balance of \$45.5 million which was invested in the State Treasurer's Short Term Investment Fund (STIF).

Student Enrollment

Enrollment. UConn Health's enrollment in Fall 2025 was approximately 461 in the School of Medicine, 205 in the School of Dental Medicine, and 345 Graduate students. Admission to each school is highly competitive, but both schools offer preferential consideration to qualified Connecticut residents in their admissions policies. Both schools have a long history of outstanding performance on the National Boards highlighted by the School of Dental Medicine's one hundred percent passing rate in recent years.

Tuition and Other Fees

Pursuant to State law, the Board of Directors is authorized to adopt a comprehensive schedule of tuition and other fees which are expected to prevail during the following fiscal year.

Tuition. For the 2026 academic year, tuition for Connecticut residents has been set at \$46,928 for School of Medicine students and \$44,875 for School of Dental Medicine students; and tuition for out-of-state students is set at \$75,113 for the School of Medicine and \$90,587 for the School of Dental Medicine.

Mandatory Fees. For the 2026 academic year, students will pay a fee of \$2,905 for the School of Medicine and \$3,277 for the School of Dental Medicine. This fee includes payments for commencement, student affairs, and a student activity fee. An optional student health plan is available for an additional fee.

UConn Health Budget

Fiscal Year 2026 Spending Plan. For Fiscal Year 2026 UConn Health is projecting a deficit of \$29.9 million. Of this amount, \$15.2 is expected to be funded by the prior year surplus. The remainder is to be identified via ongoing mitigation planning efforts.

State Support of UConn Health – Appropriations

The State develops a biennial budget, which includes UConn Health's appropriation requests. The appropriations are applicable to each specific year and the second year's appropriation is subject to review and adjustment. In June 2025, the State's budget for Fiscal Year 2026 was approved by Public Act 25-168 (HB-7287). The approved appropriation for UConn Health was \$143.5 million (\$141.7 million operating expenses, \$1.015 million Endometriosis program, \$150k Migraine Study, \$430k AHEC and \$178k Poison Control Program) for Fiscal Year 2026 and \$139.3 million (\$135.5 million operating expenses, \$1.015 million Endometriosis Program, \$150k Migraine Study, \$430k AHEC and \$178k Poison Control Program, \$2.0 million Neuromodulation Treatment) for Fiscal Year 2027.

Beginning in Fiscal Year 2024, the State implemented a change in its fringe benefit funding structure, intended to be budget-neutral, now covering all retirement fringe costs for all UConn Health employees participating in State-sponsored retirement plans. As a result, UConn Health did not pay retirement costs for these plans beginning in fiscal year 2024 and these costs and the associated State funding are not included in the budget.

Grants and Contracts

Revenue from federal, state, local and non-governmental grants and contracts totaled \$120.3 million in Fiscal Year 2025, representing 8.5% of total operating revenues reported by UConn Health in the Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Position for the Fiscal Year ended June 30, 2025. If nongovernmental grants are excluded, the revenue from federal, state, and local governmental grants and contracts totaled \$98.7 million for this time period, which represented 6.2% of total operating revenues.
